REFLECTIONS FROM THE DESK OF FR. GREGORY J. HICKEY

Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul

On Thursday of last week (June 29th) we celebrated the feasts of Saints Peter and Paul. It is a very ancient feast going back to around the year 250 A.D. The two are honored because they are the two Apostles about whom we know the most. They were the greatest influence on the Church at its beginning. Tradition has it they died together in Rome during the persecution of the Emperor Nero. Most historians suspect that Nero himself started the fire that burned most of Rome in order to clear out old houses and buildings to make room for his own ambitious building projects. Then he blamed the fire on the Christians in order to take suspicion off himself.

Peter was crucified upside down, again tradition has it that he did not consider himself worthy of dying in the same way his Master had died. Paul was beheaded. Although he was a Jew, he was also legally, by birth, a Roman citizen. Roman law decreed that Roman citizens could not be crucified because it was such a horrific way to die and being exempt from crucifixion was one of the perks of being a Roman citizen.

If you recall in 2010, the Holy Father put the spotlight on Saint Paul because the universal church was celebrating his 2,000th birthday, so in this article I would like to center on St. Paul on this combined feast day. We do not know if Paul ever saw Jesus in the flesh. He was born in Tarsus, a city in Asia Minor, which is now modern day Turkey. He spoke Greek and Aramaic and wrote all of his letters in Greek. He was a Pharisee and 1000th% dedicated to observance of Jewish Law and traditions. Sometime after the death and Resurrection of Jesus, he began persecuting the early followers of Christ.

Paul was present at the martyrdom of St. Stephen, the first martyr. He viewed those who believed in Jesus as heretics. He was such a zealous devotee to the Jewish Law that he would go looking for believers in Jesus to arrest them and persecute them. It was on such a journey to Damascus that the Risen Christ spoke to Paul. He was enveloped in a bright light and fell to the ground. There is no mention of a horse, although people are used to saying he was thrown off his horse. The idea came from a painting of the event. I rather believe Paul was walking or riding a donkey, which was the usual means of transportation.

Paul heard someone call him, and when he asked who was calling him, Jesus answered: "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting." Then Jesus said: "Now get up and go into the city and you will be told what you must do." Paul got up but he was a new man. He was ill and blind for a few days until he was healed by one of Jesus' followers and was baptized. In his encounter with Jesus, he discovered that Jesus was not a heretic and condemned criminal, but the glorified Lord who has risen from the dead and lives in His Church. He would learn that his mission would be to the Gentiles and that the good news Jesus proclaimed was to be preached to all the people. This is when Paul became an Apostles for the word Apostle means one who has been sent. He would come to understand how we are saved by Jesus' death and Resurrection, and by our incorporation into this saving event through three things: 1.) faith, 2.) the sacraments, especially Baptism and the Eucharist, and 3.) our love for one another.

Paul wrote more than any other New Testament author. One could keep on talking about him because he wrote so much. To put everything succinctly, Paul's life and mission can be summed up in the one sentence Jesus spoke to him on the way to Damascus: "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting." We might recall the most famous lines Paul wrote: "Love is kind, love is patient, love is not jealous, it is not pompous, etc." ending with the sentence: "love never fails." This kind of love Paul talks about is a love rooted in Christ. We express that love as we gather here this weekend, giving God our time and worship and praying for one another. May we continue to express that same love for one another throughout this coming week.

Both St. Peter and St. Paul were the hinges of the early Church, and both were tested, and both died a martyr's death. Both were intimately connected by their love to Jesus Christ. Every year in Rome on this feast day of SS. Peter and Paul, Our Holy Father celebrates a Mass and confers a Pallium on all the Archbishops who have been appointed since last year. The Pallium is worn over the neck and shows the connection of unity between the Archbishops and the Vicar of Christ on earth, Pope Francis. The Pallium is made of Lamb's wool which was blessed on the Feast of St. Agnes (Agnus=lamb).

Have a good week and celebrate this birthday of our nation on Tuesday, July 4th! If you are traveling, be safe.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As last year drew to a close and most people focused on the coming Christmas holiday, Pope Francis addressed all those blessed with an abundance of this world's goods. He said, "Our world today is marked by great unrest. Inequality between peoples continues to rise, and many communities are impacted...People want to make their voices heard and express their concerns and fears. They want to make their rightful contribution to their local communities and broader society, and to benefit from the resources and development too often reserved for the few."

Our Holy Father is highlighting the fact that amid plenty, there still sadly exists poverty. Many of our own cities provide vivid examples of the contrast between those "on the inside" of economic growth and those "left out of the mix." The poor are sliding backwards, often feeling as though the hope for a better day is eluding them. It is hard for us to imagine the challenges that so many of the disadvantaged face right from the start. The cycle of poverty is fueled by poor education, inadequate health care, traumatic family situations, lack of good role models, and limited job opportunities that can provide a living wage.

Yet as the Pope reminds us, the poor don't want to stay in such dire situations; they want to be heard and to make their rightful contribution toward society. As Catholics, we are called to help promote opportunities for all people to live in conditions worthy of their inherent dignity. For nearly half a century, the Catholic Campaign for Human **Development** has been a concrete expression of the Church's solidarity with the poor right here in our country. By funding community organizations working amid pockets of poverty, CCHD has proved to be an effective instrument of human development. Composed primarily of low-income people, these community groups engage the poor to actively participate in organized efforts that address the root causes of poverty. Larger projects are funded with national-level grants, while smaller efforts receive more modest funding at the local

Each year the U.S. Catholic bishops sponsor a nationwide CCHD collection in support of the Church's efforts to reduce poverty through these grassroots efforts. In the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, the annual collection will take place on the weekend of July 8th and 9th. Your contribution to the Catholic Campaign for Human Development will assist in breaking the cycle of poverty. I urge you to support this collection generously and ask God's blessing upon you for your generous response to this year's appeal.
