

Wi-Fi connected smart speakers with their hard-wired artificial intelligence have crept rather quickly and somewhat eerily into our lives. It was rather early one chilly morning not too long ago. The sun had not yet come up. I was brewing coffee and getting ready for some prayer time. Java and JC make for a great start to the day. I quietly asked my smart speaker to play some meditative instrumental music as I usually do, but





spoke back to me in a very low and faint voice. Why are you whispering? If you whisper to me, I will whisper to you! Then, "she" started to play the requested music. Weird, huh? Well, get ready—it's gonna get a whole lot weirder! Smart cars will be getting smarter. They won't just buzz



and rattle a bit when straying from the lane. They will take corrective measures themselves and maybe even give a little shock in tuckus just to make sure the driver is awake, alert and paying attention. Already, there is transcription technology at use in voicemail and with texting. Careful enunciation is oh so important especially when communicating with someone whose last name is "Dumas." Language translation technology is also already in use, though far from perfect. One need only consider poetry, idioms, and colloquialisms to understand the difficulty. Smart homes are a part of our world now, too. As we monitor our homes 24/7, now our homes are monitoring us similarly. And if all this wasn't enough, ChatGPT has made its appearance. Even experts in the field are concerned with this "Al-powered language model developed that has been trained on

a massive amount of text data from the internet and can generate human-like text responses to a given prompt. It can answer questions, converse on a variety of topics, and generate creative writing pieces." In other words, it can



fake being human. All of this melding of man and machine ála deus ex machina makes for many questions. This is precisely the time for a good deal of critical thinking and some cutting edge philosophy besides. Since philosophy is



foundational to our theology, raising questions answered ultimately by the study of God, and since the intertwining of humanity and artificial intelligence is occurring at a rapid pace, can it not be posited that attention need turn to what

might be called "AI" theology? Can machines be ethical? Can machines be moral? Can machines make decisions - or do they rather make calculations? Here perhaps is just one key of what will be for sure a continuing and necessary conversation. Machines, computers, and AI are binary systems that indeed calculate based on data input and outcomes sought. Machines calculate. Humans decide. Faith, ultimately, is not a calculation of some desired outcome (Heaven), but a choice made to Love. Sorry, Mr. Pascal! That Love is always in the present moment – a bit of Heaven on earth if you will! There's nothing weird about it! This is something the most "intelligent" of machines can never know, but only One Who is most fully human Deum de Dio! For God so loved the world, that (in His Mercy) He sent us His Only Begotten Son that everyone who chooses Him might be saved and have Eternal Life! (cf. John 3:16)
