Aside from the getting lost part and experiencing the beginning of heat stroke, it was quite the beautiful day and makes for quite the story. Really, any day is a great day for hiking in the Bavarian National Forest - despite a touch of delirium



and a bit of disorientation. My friend, Franz, invited me. We've known each other for many years. He was off work that day. It would be a bit of a break for him from his responsibilities as husband and father as well. His wife, Sandra, gave her consent knowing, of course, that she was getting a little break too! Our goal would be the Great Falkenstein, a mountain with scenic overlook at 4,314 feet. It isn't all that far from the Czech border. Franz made sure to tell me to wear hiking shoes and comfortable clothing. A hat would be needed along with sun block, sunglasses, water, and some snacks for along the way. We left early the morning of our hike. After a bit of a drive, we arrived in the Lindberg area. We parked across from Hotel Scharnagl secured our hiking wares and began our trek up into the wilderness. One always starts a hike enthusiastically; it doesn't always end that way. We were

expecting about a three hour or so hike, not a six hour one. The climb to the top went well. I was taking in all the sights and enjoying the thick

forest. There was a stunning waterfall and a few deer scampering about. It was quite the warm day. Finally arriving at the peak, Franz and I took the requisite selfie. Then, we sat a bit to rest, eat, and enjoy the scenic overlook before heading back down the mountainside. Unfortunately, the water that I brought with me was sitting in the car. I figured that it was *only* a three hour hike and I didn't feel like carrying the bottle. Big mistake! Franz shared some of his water with me. Although the trails have markers and we had no problem going up, somehow on the way down we wound up off trail. No beautiful waterfall here! It seems that we were on a small logging path of sorts. Heck, there weren't even any deer. Then, it seemed that we were on no trail at all. Uh oh! Franz remained confident. *Don't worry, I have my phone.* After playing with its GPS mapping for a few minutes, he pointed in a direction and we were off. After some time, there was still no path or trail marker.



There was more googling and the discovery of some road. Eureka! That must be it! We found the road alright, except now we were below where we needed to be. It was time to climb back uphill. Ugggh! Eventually, we came across a trail marker and followed it closely without any deviation like some kind of Pharisee or Scholar of the Law. What we really needed was an Emmaus experience with the Risen Lord. Eventually, we did get back to the Jerusalem parking lot where our car was. I was really feeling sick. After offering some to Franz, I quickly drank the entire bottle of now hot water that had been in the car all that time. We walked across the street to the hotel to eat at the outdoor cafe. I had to drink more water first — much more. After ordering food, I couldn't eat it right away - just looking at it made me nauseous. Franz, himself, was okay. He said to sit, hydrate, and take your time. We weren't in any hurry. Eventually, I was able to eat a bit. Trust me! Heatstroke is nothing to mess with. Well, I sure did learn a lesson about hiking and heat! It's a life lesson: hydrate and stay on the trail! Of course, the same is true of our Faith. In our crazy world today where so many seem to be "lost in the woods" and many are suffering a "heatstroke" of sorts, we need to be guides as we render aid. We need to provide the Emmaus experience for those lost offering hydration and nourishment in the form of Word and Eucharist. It is only then that the journey undertaken is most fully understood and enjoyed despite difficulties, because beautiful days, friendship, and scenic mountain overlooks, in the end, make for quite the story!
