ADMINISTRATOR'S COLUMN

It's amazing how much things have changed in a few months. My usual routine before leaving the house is to double check that I have my wallet, phone, and keys before closing the door. Now, I've had to add a mask and hand sanitizer to that mental list. The other day I was halfway to the entrance of a store before I realized I left my mask in the car and had to turn around – feeling like the eyes of the world were on me and mocking me for being so absent-minded! My guess is I'm not the only one to whom that's happened. We've all had to alter our way of thinking and doing things as a result of this pandemic, and in many ways we're still adjusting.

That's certainly been the case with the life of the Church as well. Things are markedly different than they were just a few months ago. You used to come into a church and bless yourself with holy water; now you have to squirt sanitizer on your hands. I'm sure some of you haven't been able to sit in your favorite pew because it's been roped off in the interest of social distancing. And of course, everyone is asked to wear a mask. I thank all of you for your flexibility and willingness to accommodate the changes we've been asked to implement in an effort to keep everyone healthy.

At the same time, we have to be careful that we're still being reverent and respectful while we're worshiping at Mass. One area of concern is the reception of Holy Communion, and the challenge that mask-wearing offers. Out of respect for the Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, we have to ensure that our focus at the moment of reception is on Jesus, who is coming to us personally in the Sacrament. To that end, I ask everyone to remove your mask before placing your hands out to receive the Sacred Host. After you receive and consume the Host, you should put your mask back on. Sometimes people come up to receive while their mask is on, and they end up trying to remove their masks while still holding the Sacred Host in their hands. There is, of course, a greater risk of dropping the Host when this happens, and in that time of fiddling with the mask, our attention is no longer on Jesus and the most sacred event taking place. So again, remove mask, reverently receive and consume host, replace mask.

I know we're all adjusting and getting used to "the new normal," and I'm sure there will be times where people will forget to pull down or take off their mask. If that's you one day, please don't be offended or embarrassed if I or another Minister of Communion ask you to remove your mask first. We just want to make sure we're giving Our Lord the respect and attention He deserves in the moment.

As I said a few weeks ago, I'm edified by the number of people who have returned to Mass here at the parish. That shows this parish is filled with great people with great faith, which makes it a joy to be here. Thank you!
