Recently, a heretofore rather unknown country musician has been in the news. His simply produced music video has him standing on a grassy patch near some woods playing his guitar while singing the song he wrote. His three dogs lie



nearby. The song, Rich Men North of Richmond, quickly went viral with millions of views. As of Monday this past week, it still ranked number one on *iTunes*. The artist, Oliver Anthony, certainly never expected that. The song has also generated a good deal of controversy political in nature as well. Uh oh. Oliver Anthony, whose real name is Christopher Anthony Lunsford, didn't expect that either.

Lunsford's song tells the story of those blue collar folks struggling daily to make ends meet while being seemingly

ignored and even mocked by the crowd working inside that famed Beltway just north of Richmond. I'm not going to address the lyrics, or the ensuing controversy surrounding this song. You can look it up if you're interested and decide for yourself. I'm more of a punk,





grunge, heavy metal head banger type of guy anyway. Talk about controversy! No, I want to address a "controversy" of a different sort and what some might call "foolishness" as well. Mr. Lunsford it seems, beyond the now famous song itself, has spawned an even greater "controversy" – and just maybe a lesson for life as well. Lunsford revealed that he has been approached by music industry executives following his song's viral ascent. I would be surprised if someone hasn't already approached him concerning a movie offer

as well. The former factory worker dropped out of high school at 17. He was injured at work and suffered a skull fracture. More recently, he was working in the field of industrial manufacturing sales. His stage name is that of his grandfather, to whom his interest in music is dedicated. There's nothing special about me. I'm not a good musician. I've spent the last 5 years struggling with mental health and using alcohol to drown it.



I am sad to see the world in the state it's in, with everyone fighting each other. I have spent many nights feeling *hopeless.* He says that he hates the way that the internet has divided all of us with so many distractions and just like those once wandering in the desert, we have lost our way from God. This blue collar, nothing special, actually living in the country - country music artist has, however, turned



down thus far, the multi-million dollar record deals offered. Talk about controversy! Music industry executives were perplexed and aghast. His reasoning itself could make for a chart topping new song. I don't want 6 tour buses, 15 tractor trailers, and a jet. I don't want to play stadium shows. I don't want to be in the spotlight. I wrote the music I wrote because I was suffering. They're being sung by someone feeling the words in the very moment they were being sung. No editing, no agent, no bull**** - just some idiot and his guitar. It would seem that Mr. Lunsford already possesses



something that no amount of money can ever buy and what he still desires can only be won over - not bought. Mr. Lunsford has his guitar and his music. He has his trailer home and a little plot of land. He also has his dogs and I'm sure a number of good friends. He seems to be a man self-possessed desiring that people just get along and help one another along as we go through this life together. He's like a preacher man in a sense along the lines of a certain preacher



Man of old that was from a little back woods, country town Himself. Maybe if we took time to heed the words of them both, many of the controversies of our world today, political and otherwise, wouldn't be so controversial.
