REFLECTIONS FROM THE DESK OF FR. GREGORY J. HICKEY "1st Sunday of Advent"

Happy New Year! We begin a new liturgical year in the Church today and we will begin a new cycle of readings for Cycle "A." Although our society has begun its preparations for the birth of Christ, even as they are hesitant to mention His birth, the Church begins its preparations today. Our Liturgy, however, wants us to know that we are not only preparing for a special celebration four weeks from now, but our readings put before us the bigger picture. It's not just the celebration of Jesus' birth that we are to prepare for but also we must prepare for the day when He comes again to bring us His kingdom. Advent tells us that Christ is coming, but it also asks us, are we ready to meet Him? If we're not, His coming 2,000 years ago will have little or no value for us.

For some people His second coming will be a frightening time. "People will die in fright in anticipation of what is coming into the world..." But if we are prepared, not just for Christmas, but for Christ, the Lord tells us "stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand." His coming will be for those who have followed him faithfully every day. Each day brings forth victory and joy.

Doesn't it sound as if Our Lord is speaking to us today when He tells us: "Be on guard lest your spirits become bloated with indulgence and drunkenness and worldly cares." We have to struggle against this happening to all of us during this time of year. I'm going to add a thought of my own to this list of things Jesus tells us to guard against. Make sure to get enough rest. When we are tired, it's hard to stay organized, focused, and to keep our priorities straight, and to pray. If we don't pray and keep our priorities straight, Christmas will leave us feeling empty and relieved that it's all over.

The Gospel's suggestion for us today as we being Advent is: "Be vigilant at all times and make time to pray..." Is there a better formula we can apply to this season to prepare for the celebration of Christ's birth or the coming of Christ at the end of our lives or at the end of time? I'm not going around like Scrooge saying "Bah, humbug!" to Christmas. I like decorations, lights, parties, cards and gifts, but to prepare ourselves for what this season of the year is all about, nothing will do the job better than prayer and good works.

You might consider attending daily Mass in the chapel for the Season of Advent. We have Mass on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Daily Mass is approximately 25-30 minutes and is a wonderful way to start the day. On Mondays, we have Eucharistic Adoration after the 9:00 a.m. Mass and Our Lord is exposed in the Monstrance till 4:00 p.m. Feel free to stop in for a few minutes on Monday and place yourself in the Lord's presence and speak to Him and let Him speak to you. You could visit neighbors who are in the hospital or stop and spend some time with those in nursing homes who do not receive many visitors. There are any number of things you could do to prepare yourself for the coming of Jesus at Christmas and you would be helping others as well as yourself.

Now is the time to do it. No doubt you have heard this poem before, but it won't hurt to repeat is. It is entitled *"Today."* I shall do much in the years to come, but what have I done today? I shall give out gold in princely sum, but what did I give today? I shall lift the heart and dry the tear; I shall plant a hope in the place of fear; I shall speak with words of love and cheer, but what have I done today? I shall be so kind in the after while, but what have I been today? I shall bring to each lonely life a smile, but what have I brought today? I shall give to truth a grander birth, and to steadfast faith a deeper worth, I shall feed the hungering souls of earth, but whom have I fed today? Happy Advent! Have a good week!

Dear Friends in Christ,

Soon our parishes will be conducting the collection for the Retirement Fund for Religious. This annual appeal benefits 31,000 elderly Catholic sisters, brothers, and religious order priests—women and men who have consecrated their lives to serving God and the Church. We are blessed to have 74 religious congregations present and serving within the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. These 74 religious congregations represent approximately 2400 men and women religious. Of this number, over 800 are retired.

With this in mind, many religious communities struggle to provide for their aging members. During the early and midtwentieth centuries, the Catholic Church in the United States experienced a surge in vocations to religious life, with numbers peaking in the mid-1960s. Care for elderly members was provided largely by younger ones. Over time, however, the number of vocations decreased while lifespans increased. The result is far fewer younger members available to support the retirement and eldercare needs of senior members. In 2018, 68 percent of the religious communities providing data to the National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) had a median age of 70 or older.

I recognize this is but one of numerous worthy causes in need of assistance; I ask simply that you give what you can. In thanksgiving for their faithful service, please join me in supporting the Retirement Fund for Religious and in praying for God's blessing on our nation's elderly religious.

The annual <u>Retirement Fund For Religious collection</u> will be held December 7-8, 2019 in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. The appeal is coordinated by the NRRO.

In addition to sponsoring the annual appeal, the NRRO offers assessment tools, educational programming, services, and resources that promote quality eldercare and help religious communities plan for long-term retirement needs.

I ask prayers for our consecrated religious and encourage support for this national collection scheduled for December 7-8, 2019 in our local parishes. Thank you.
