It's a fundamental question of life I suppose. It speaks of us and who we are at a given moment in time. The answer is certainly subject to change. You know the type of question. Do you prefer dark meat or white? What about chocolate or vanilla? Are you boxers or briefs? As a good citizen of the Philadelphia region would you rather a cheese steak or hoagie? And of course, at this time of year one must decide between real and artificial. Throughout my childhood our Christmas tree was always the same each year. Well, it wasn't exactly the same. It was the same artificial tree year in and year out, but we changed over the years. That made all the difference. I have such fond memories of those times. A day and time would be designated by parents. It might be that first Friday or Saturday evening in December. A year's worth of living meant that the tree had to be rediscovered each Advent. Other boxes and things inevitably wound up on top of it, in front of it, and beside it. While other youngsters my age accompanied their parents perhaps to a tree farm or the deserted end of a supermarket parking lot where a man was selling pre-cut trees, I explored the dark cave that was the very front of our basement with my father in order to rediscover a tree. Together, we would trudge the box



up the basement steps and into the living room of our house. Dust and dirt would accompany us and my mother was already at hand with the vacuum. Some Christmas music playing along with hot chocolate and cookies welcomed the men as they returned from the dark and damp depths of the basement netherworld. The unboxing would then begin. The straightening and

fluffing of branches came first. A boy would jump back from and then hunt down a stray spider or two. My father would screw together the tree trunk and mount it carefully in the stand. The color coded branches were then inserted and a Christmas tree almost magically began to appear. The real "fun" then began with the tree lights. Every year it was a matter of trying to figure out which lights worked and those that didn't. Was it simply a matter of



one bulb being out or was the whole string bad? My father would be muttering some unmentionables under his breath and he or I would inevitably step on a string of lights in our stocking feet. Ouch! After the lights



were strung, garland was then wrapped around our already beautiful tree. We were a garland family and not tinsel...another fundamental question! Finally, the ornaments were placed carefully upon the tree and when finished we would all step back in admiration. Merry Christmas, indeed! And another round of cocoa for all! I don't know if my parents knew, but sometimes as a child I would just stare at that tree in awe. I would plug in the lights and sort of just lie underneath it "Christmas-dreaming" one might say. I still do my "Christmas dreaming." The Perry Como song of the same name (Christmas Dream) is one of my favorites this time of year. My dreaming doesn't take place lying beneath the old

Christmas tree of my youth now, but rather a tree of a different sort. This Tree is very much real, but sometimes we are the ones artificial before it. Take a little time this Advent to Christmas dream beneath the Tree that one finds in the Eucharist. There one will discover the Tree of the Cross most beautifully decorated and shining brilliantly. There one will discover one's loved ones and families. There one will discover oneself anew amidst the uncertainties of life and dreaming a whole new and hopeful Christmas dream. Just be careful not to step on any lights and watch out for those darn spiders!
