Somewhere around, there is an old photograph of a lanky sixteen year old, attired in cuffed blue jeans with a rolled-sleeve blue flannel shirt, sporting an afro stylish for the time, and standing in front of *the* most perfect Christmas tree.

It was shortly after his dear mother's death in Advent of that year and it was the first real



Christmas tree that he ever had. The artificial tree of his childhood certainly held many beautiful memories from Christmases past, but they all involved memories of his mother – and she was now gone. He decided that it was time to start a new Christmas tradition: a real tree. The tree would not come from some temporary shop set up on the far end of a supermarket parking lot, but would come from an actual tree farm. He, together with his best friend, secretly commandeered the super cab, super sized, new used nick-up truck that his father had so



super cab, super sized, new used pick-up truck that his father had so recently acquired. It was really too much truck for city dwellers and would soon enough be resold as a heartbroken father's mid-life crisis peaked.

That truck however, served a most high and noble purpose for the relatively short time had. It would be the sleigh to transport that most perfect tree. The two recently licensed drivers climbed into that massive sleigh and set out for a tree farm discovered in the upper regions of Bucks County. Traversing for miles on a nearly empty tank and after a few wrong turns, they finally arrived. There was a beautiful sea of evergreen trees for about as far as the eye could see. Setting out they meandered row after row sizing up trees. It was a most sunny day and it was the sun shining perfectly upon a particular evergreen that caused the one



young man to say, "Here! This is it!" It **was** perfect. The other teen soon found his tree as well. Tree saws in the hands



of youth make for quick work and soon they were atop a wagon making the trek back to the barn for purchase of said trees – and for some hot chocolate so kindly offered. The return trip was celebratory. The city dwellers turned arborists had grand success and had

conquered, what was for them, a whole new world. Back home the secret commandeering of the truck by two young drivers of so little experience was quickly forgiven by a father whose anger was suddenly soothed by the beauty of a tree that outshone and overcame it. Even the other teen



remarked with a bit of jealousy of just how beautiful **that** tree was. Soon decorated, it continued to shine throughout that Christmas season and beyond. Its beauty miraculously helped overcome a tremendous amount of pain and sorrow experienced between a father and his son that Christmas of

so long ago. The beauty of that most perfect tree still shines to this day. You may have noticed that quite a few folks had their decorations and lawn inflatables out early this year. Some went right up after Halloween. Our world is filled with much distress. War and violence make for daily headlines such that we no longer seem to notice. There is much



confusion and seemingly so little concern. There is fear for what the future holds. Everyone knows this. Christmas decorations and beautiful trees adorned betray our deepest longings.

Everyone without exception desires happiness and its preceding hope. All of the Christmas decorations that we see proclaim hope and happiness. They proclaim a desire to overcome fear and confusion with their attending sorrow and sadness. The message



of Christmas is a message of hope. In fact, the message of Christmas is preceded by a season of hope. That's what Advent is all about. Amidst the darkness of our world, Hope will be born anew lying quietly and barely noticed in a manger. The Child will grow and the Hope that He

offers will grow as well enveloping all like a beautiful sea of evergreens. It all begins with that one most perfect and beautiful tree. It is a tree unlike any other. May you find yours this Christmas!
