Tradition tells us that Joseph was already an "old" man at the time of Jesus' birth. While Mary was a young



maiden probably in her late teens, Joseph was in all likelihood pushing the boundary of antiquity in his twenties. We do know that no mention is made of this silent saint of Scripture beyond the time of the Holy Family at Nazareth. The presumption is that Joseph, who speaks ne'er a word recorded, died quietly during this time. Thus, it has always been understood that Joseph preceded Mary in death. Well, now I'm not so sure. Maybe, in fact, it was Mary that encountered death before Joseph. Okay. I'll explain. Celebrating Christmas always has me recalling the time in grade school that I was asked by Sister Margaret to play the part of Saint Joseph in the annual Christmas Pageant. It was quite the honor to be the eighth grade boy that was chosen especially

when Saint Joseph was the very namesake and patron of our little school. I was especially delighted that Saint Joseph had no lines and did no public speaking. I didn't like public speaking then and, believe it or not, deep down, I still don't like it. Considering that I now speak publicly every day, all that I can say is "Behold the Grace of Ordination!" Of course, I know that some people wish that I had a little less "grace" at times, particularly when the tummy's growling. Anyway, the Christmas Pageant that year was beautiful. My parents were so

proud. I can remember turning red and getting very warm when Joseph's role required him to take and hold Mary's hand. Mary was beautiful; stunning, in fact. With hands that were now profusely sweating, Joseph was getting light-headed and about ready to pass out. See what old age can do! Sister Margaret had to keep telling me to stop wiping my hands on my tunic! What's wrong with you? Sorry, Sister, but it's Mary! She keeps making me sweat! The Blessed Mother giggled. Mary was played by Marybeth. Marybeth was such a nice girl! She was always so nice to me despite my quiet demeanor and I have to say that she was always nice with everyone. Her looks matched her personality and her academic abilities. She was



always one of the smartest kids in our class and this remained the case through high school. I'll always relish having played the part of Joseph with her. Just at the end of our high school days, there was some very sad news received concerning my pageant partner that had made me so sweat. I was sweating again, but for a different reason. There was a tragic car accident in Upper Bucks. It was fatal. Mary did indeed encounter death before Joseph. We say that the Blessed Mother was assumed into heaven simply "falling asleep" at the end of her earthly life, but long before that and long before Joseph, she did encounter death. Mary had long before died to self in favor of living for God and her fiat before the angel, Gabriel, and that which we now celebrate make that superabundantly clear. *Be it done unto me according to Thy will!* The reality is that these are, in fact, words that we can now attribute to Joseph as well. So, yes! Mary did encounter death before her husband. It was her "dying" that allowed her to bear Life, that would then allow her husband to bear It, and allow all of us to bear It this Christmas and beyond. All we need do is echo those words of her that we find echoed in Joseph. It is then that we just begin to play a part in the true Christmas Pageant that takes place not annually but eternally. A Pageant of unspeakable beauty and awe where Joseph's hands will for sure sweat once again.
