## A Message From The Pastor



It was twenty-two years ago now. For those old enough to remember, on the one hand, it was a time of great hope and excitement. On the other hand, there was just a bit of anxiety to say the least. The calendar back then would be flipping not just into a new year, but into a whole new century. Humankind would be entering in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. It would be a once in a lifetime remembrance save for those rare few who might live well over a hundred. The century that the year 2000 would usher in was looked upon as futuristic and fantastic. It would involve space odysseys and technological marvels. There was a sense that the Twentieth Century and its wars and weapons of mass destruction were indeed behind us. Hope abounded. The Twin Towers still stood as testimony to human accomplishment and ingenuity. Viral pandemics and government mandates were still the stuff of 1984 science fiction. The anxiety at the time arose largely because of dire reports of imminent computer failures. IT folks were worried. The fledgling internet would fail. Our binary system of technological wonder would not properly respond to 1999 ending and 2000 beginning.



The whole behemoth would implode much like WOPR in the movie, *War Games*. Planes might fall from the sky. Defense systems would fail. Nuclear war might begin. And don't even think about programming your VCR. In addition to these ever so slightly frightening scenarios, some men and women of the cloth of various faiths were prophesying the end...that's right...**the** End. The apocalypse was (once again) at hand. The Almighty One would appear in His most glorious Second Coming wielding a great Sword of Wrath upon all unbelievers. Nice. With all this in mind, what was one to do? Well, to be honest most partied like it was 1999. Kinda makes sense doesn't it? Go out with a bang one way or the other. What's a transitional deacon to do? It was my last year in the seminary and priestly ordination loomed on the horizon if there would still be a horizon come the next morning. The seminary that year offered a prayer service together with Mass for those interested. It was completely voluntary and optional. Most sems would be with family and friends and the '99 crowd. I figured that I'd hedge my bet. If everything did "blow up" and the Mighty One appeared in the sky as planes fell, I figured that it couldn't hurt being in our chapel at Mass. At the very least, I might score some brownie points. And if the sun did, in fact, rise the next morning on that first day of 2000, what better place for a soon to be priest to start things off than at Mass? At any rate, I "packed a light bag" just in case I might be ascending that stairway to heaven come dawn. Twenty-two years later I'm still at the foot of the stairs — as are you. Phew! I'm ever grateful for God's patience with all of us and His priestly gift to me. Gratitude isn't something just for Thanksgiving Day. Perhaps it is the quality most needed on New Year's Day. As we now enter the twenty-second year of this crazy century, there are more than just a few concerns that can get us just a wee bit upset and cause us a great deal of anxiety. The antidote to this is the same as it was at the beginning of the century: an overwhelming gratitude for what has been and an abounding hope for what will yet be. The Risen Lord may not yet appear in the sky, but He is ever and always present and He gives a power that the world cannot. It is a power that overcomes all things, conquers kingdoms, vanquishes viral pandemics, proclaims peace not war, and opens minds and hearts to a Faith in a whole New and Eternal life. And it all begins with the flip of a calendar. See you in church at the foot of the stairs!
