They were two questions that I had never considered - ever. It was some of my classmates that confronted me in early



grade school in a very animated discussion. *I wasn't sure*, was my answer to both queries. They couldn't believe it. *You have to*, they exclaimed! I didn't know it was a rule. Were my parents negligent in never having informed me of this? I needed time to ponder the matter. Imagine that. My pondering would begin at recess and then I would ponder some more at home that night. I brought the serious matter before my parents. My father chuckled for some reason as my mother explained to me that no, it was not a rule, but many people have them. It was totally up to me. I could choose. Although we had recently gotten our first new

color TV, and although I was very good at counting, I never gave a thought to having either a favorite color or number. Why would I have a favorite? I figured I pretty much liked them all - a most colorful rainbow ad infinitum. Nevertheless,

it was to my dear and beloved classmates that I ultimately had to give answer. I'll show them, I thought. Favorite numbers back then, generally, were understood as being from one to nine. I realize it's a little different today in our world of multiple digit state and parish (plenty of tickets still available!) lotteries. It was the number nine that stood out for me. This number really encompasses all of the other numbers, I thought. Nine it would be! Now, what about a color? This was a little more





difficult. My decision, in the end, had to do with the drama of law and order that *u*nfolded on my humble, little city block almost every day and a unique Philadelphia phenomenon. As a kid, my friends and I played a whole lot of "cops and robbers." The school bus became the "police academy bus," as we spent most days at the

"academy" learning law and order from Sister Sergeant, SSJ. She also taught us various restraining techniques throughout the day and

demonstrated often how a ruler, yard stick, chalkboard eraser, or just a very mean stare, can offer far greater protection than any toy cap gun ever could. Since we were officers in training, we paid much attention to the real officers that patrolled our neighborhood. At that time, Philadelphia police





cars were red hence, the color that I would choose. Philadelphians of a certain age remember the lingo on the street. Everyone knew there was

a problem if one had to call for a "red car." Eventually, red was besmirched as an "inflammatory color" and it was replaced for quite a while by a sort of sky blue. Eventually, the special blend of "police car blue" became a financially inflammatory color and it was replaced by the current standard white with decals slapped on it. At any rate, I now had favorites. I wonder if the Lord had His favorites. As a kid, he wouldn't have played "cops and

robbers," but maybe "Zealots and Romans." He wouldn't have chosen the red of a Roman soldier, but maybe the black

of a Zealot hidden in the night. He would go on to shine a bright white Light upon both red Roman soldiers and Zealots hiding in the blackness of night. As the color of Resurrection, I suppose every Christian must give a preeminence to white. As far as



numbers go, Jesus came proclaiming unity and oneness, so it would seem that He would have a preference for the color "white" and the number "one." Regardless of whatever your favorites might be, during the Week of Christian Unity shine the bright white Light of the Oneness



of our Faith anew. Doing so will dispel disbelief and, in the end, leave that Evil Guy who

wants to rob us all, handcuffed and on his way to the Eternal Prison while riding, of course, in the back seat of a red car!
