

IMPORTANT INFORMATION
FOR THE EASTER VIGIL from
the Office for Divine Worship:
Time of the Easter Vigil 2024 The Easter Vigil is the first
Mass of Easter Sunday and not

in any way to be considered an Anticipated Mass for Easter Sunday. This is why the discipline of the Church insists that it should not begin before nightfall in any circumstance. It may be helpful to know that sunset, according to a variety of models, occurs approximately at 7:23 PM on March 30, 2024. In general, given the variable date for Easter, it seems best to schedule the Easter Vigil each year for 8:00 PM or later.



FAST & ABSTINENCE DURING LENT - The Bishops of the United States prescribe, as minimal obligation, that all persons who are 14 years of age and older are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and on all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. Further, all persons 18 years of age and older, up to and including their 59th birthday, are bound to fast be limiting themselves to a single full meal on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, while the other two meals on those days are to be light.

ACTS OF PENANCE FOR LENT - All the faithful are encouraged, when possible, to participate at Mass and to receive the Holy Eucharist daily, to celebrate frequently the Sacrament of Penance, to undertake spiritual reading, especially the study of the Sacred Scriptures, and to participate in parish Lenten devotions. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is especially recommended.

<u>OPERATION RICE BOWL</u> - All are encouraged to participate in Operation Rice Bowl which has aided countless hungry persons here in the Archdiocese as well as throughout our nation and our world. Rice Bowls are available at the entrances to church.

I lost a bit of wisdom that day...and a good deal of blood besides. Nevertheless, I gained quite a lot of insight, thanks



to a certain Monsignor. Anesthesia is a very interesting thing. Truly, it is a marvel of modern times. No longer is there need to "bite the bullet." That wouldn't really have been an option for me anyway, since I had an oral surgeon's implements in my mouth along with the hand that was holding them. Although the teeth are known as "wisdom," they certainly don't seem to bear much of that virtue. Maybe that's why the dentist suggested that they be removed, Rucking people and since 1856 before any "wisdom" turns into the folly of infection. My upper "wisdoms" were exposed. They were easy to remove. It was a different story concerning my lower third molars. They were impacted into my jaw and looked to be sideways as per the x-ray. Although both were scheduled to be

removed the same day, that would not be possible. I had lost so much blood with the first extraction that the second would have to wait. The doctor said that he did not want me to "bleed out." Thanks, Doc! I usually try to keep as much of my blood as possible. The day finally arrived for the second and final extraction of that tiny bit of "wisdom" left that I had buried in my jaw. The role anesthesia plays in any kind of surgery cannot be understated. It knocks one out...in



more ways than one. Anyone being anesthetized needs assistance after surgery. It is mandated that patients make arrangements to be transported. It was on that day of "final wisdom" that a wiser pastor much my senior offered to assist. He would not only take me

back to the rectory in his car, but he first would come into the office and sit with me through the "post-op" instructions. Going under anesthesia is easy. I was told to count backwards from one hundred. I think that I made it to ninety-eight. Coming out of anesthesia is much different. It's kind of dreamy and cool. You seem to simply love everyone and everything especially the nurse that's trying so hard to get your attention. I don't know




why she was laughing, but she had such a beautiful smile. I have a vague and foggy memory

of sitting in a chair and a kind doctor speaking. His lips were moving, but I had no idea what he was saying. The nurse was holding my hand and still smiling. She had such a beautiful smile. Did I mention that already? Suddenly, I noticed Monsignor sitting there too! Where did he come from? I bet he came to see the nurse's smile. The next thing I know is that everyone was helping me get up. They were all so nice. Monsignor had his arm locked around mine as I shuffled



through the office now like a man very much his senior. He got me into his car and asked me if I was okay. He was so nice and now he had a nice smile too. God only knows what I said

on that ride back to the rectory – well, God and Monsignor. I hope that I thanked him that day in the midst of my fog. I think I did like a hundred times, but one can't say thank you enough. Though I lost a bit of wisdom that day, it was his kindness as priest, pastor, and friend that gave me a whole new insight. Helping one another,





on a day that I thought that I had actually lost a bit along with a good deal of blood besides. I hope that this Lent you gain this True Wisdom as well – no anesthesia needed!
