# FAST & ABSTINENCE AND OTHER ACTS OF PENANCE

**FOR LENT:** The Bishops of the United States prescribe, as minimal obligation, that all persons who are fourteen years of age and older are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, on all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. Further, all persons eighteen years of age and older, up to and including their fifty-ninth birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, while the other two meals on those days are to be light.

All the faithful are encouraged, when possible, to participate at Mass and to receive the Holy Eucharist daily, to celebrate frequently the Sacrament of Penance, to undertake spiritual reading, especially the study of the Sacred Scriptures, and to participate in parish Lenten devotions as well as Lenten education programs. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is especially recommended.

**CONFESSIONS:** Wednesdays, March 22, 29 and April 5 from 12:30 PM to 1:00 PM. Saturdays, March 25 and April 1 from 3:00 PM to 3:45 PM.

ADORATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT: Wednesdays, March 22, 29 and April 5 from 9:30 AM to 1:00 PM and 1:30 PM to 5:00 PM. Benediction at 5:00 PM.



The house in which I lived in my younger days was one of three that may parents had considered buying after

deciding to move from the little brick row home of my infancy in North Philly. One home was just outside the city. Another was in the Far Northeast section of town. The house bought was in the East Oak Lane neighborhood and for me, as a child, that neighborhood was as quaint as the name implies. I probably really did have some neighbor named Mister Rogers. The selection of that home by may parents involved several factors. All three would have been within budget, so finance wasn't in question. You know the saying. In the end, it all came down to *location, location, location.* Well that, and the fact that my mother didn't drive. The home in the Far Northeast was exactly that. Far! My mother thought that it was much too far away





from where her father and sisters lived. Visiting them would involve an all day excursion on public transportation with a young child. She exercised her divinely given veto power over my father. The suburban home didn't even stand a chance. Although situated close to a lovely little creek much like the Manatawny, the Tookany didn't capture my mother's charm at all simply because there was no public transportation nearby. No transit! No way, José! East Oak Lane it would be!

Sometimes I wonder what might have been if one of the other homes were chosen instead. Call it a - *It's a* 

Wonderful Life moment. What would happen if certain things were erased from one's life? One's life would be quite different for sure. I would have gone to different schools. I would have had a different circle of friends. Maybe some of those friends would have not been the best and I would have wound up living very, very far away from anything even close to the neighborhood of Mister Rogers. The foundation of one's life is made up of many different facets and stones. Some of those stones are quite precious indeed. In fact, they are not just stones, but gems. God has a plan for



each one of us. Oftentimes jarring as it unfolds, it is quite beautiful and astounding as one looks back with aged eyes. Unbeknownst to me as a child, a foundation was being laid through parents, family, and friends. Through all of them a Faith and a Vocation were being nurtured. Living Stones of happiness and, at times, sadness were being set one upon another and so, here I am today. Once a foundation is laid and a house is built it has to be maintained. Over the years, our house received new windows, siding, paint, and porch



besides. There were carpets replaced and ceilings repaired due to absent minded sons with golf club in hand. But after all of this, it is still the same house on the same foundation in the same neighborhood. Lent is indeed a most beautiful day in the Neighborhood. It is a time to be most grateful for the Foundation of God's Plan in our lives and a time for the on-going maintenance of the House built upon that Foundation. What is your maintenance project this

Lent on that House of Faith built upon Living Stones in the Neighborhood where you live – and would you be mine? Could you be mine? Won't **you** be **my** neighbor?
