#### REFLECTIONS FROM THE DESK OF FR. GREGORY J. HICKEY

### Weekend of November 24th and 25th, 2018 - "What's inside St. Gabriel Church?"

This question has been asked of me by adults as well as children and so I thought I would write an article explaining many of the things you would find inside our Church. Sometimes we take these items for granted and other times we want to know specifics but never ask.

**Stations of the Cross** are a series of pictures, paintings, or engravings on the wall inside the Church depicting the passion of Christ (the events leading to his death). The faithful use them as aids in prayer. We have fourteen Stations of the Cross on the walls of our Church.

**Holy Water Font**, is a container for holy water placed at the doors to the Church. People use the water to bless themselves as they enter and leave the church. The real significance of taking holy water is to remind us of our Baptism.

**Pew** is a seat for worshipers in the Church. The kneeler is in front of the pew and can be put down for kneeling. We have many pews and that is where you sit on the weekend. Don't forget to genuflect before you enter the pew as a sign of respect for the Blessed Sacrament.

**Confessional** is a room or private area where the Sacrament of Reconciliation occurs. Our confessional is in the back of the Church. Sometimes, I use the sacristy for penance services. The penitent always has the option of face-to-face or anonymous Confessions.

**Ambo** is the podium or lectern from which the readings are proclaimed. It takes its name from a word meaning "elevated," and is based on the raised platforms from which rabbis read.

**Baptismal Font** is the basin containing blessed water in which new members of the Church are baptized. The water in the font may be moving, representing the "living water" by which people are reborn into the faith. Our font is in the front of the Church on the Blessed Mother's Side.

**Statue** is a likeness of Jesus, a member of the Holy Family, a saint or an angel that helps people recall the example of the person depicted. The faithful do not worship statues, they serve only as a reminder and source of inspiration.

**Paschal Candle** is the large wax candle that is blessed on Holy Saturday during the Easter Vigil. It represents the light of Christ. It is lit for Baptisms and funerals.

**Crucifix** is a cross with the figure of the crucified Christ on it. Its purpose is to remind us of the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

**Altar** is the table on which the Eucharistic sacrifice is offered. It is both a sacrificial altar, recalling Christ's sacrifice, and a table around which we gather for the meal, the Eucharist. Eucharist comes from the Greek word meaning "thanksgiving."

**Tabernacle** is the gold repository behind our main altar. It holds the consecrated hosts of Christ's actual presence.

**Sanctuary Lamp** is a light, normally a burning candle, contained within red glass that is placed before the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. It reminds us that Jesus is present in the tabernacle.

**Censer, or Thurible**, is the metal container in which incense is burned. The fragrant smoke that rises symbolizes our prayer rising to God. We usually use this at funerals and at Benediction.

**President's Chair** is the chair for the priest (Fr. Hickey) or the main celebrant of the Mass. It usually is on a platform but because of my feet and legs, I have it on the floor.

**Ambry** is the box in which the Holy Oils are kept. They are kept in glass jars near the Baptismal Font. The Holy Oils are used for Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders, and Anointing of the Sick. They are: Oil of Catechumens, Sacred Chrism, and Oil of the Sick. They are blessed by Archbishop Chaput on Holy Thursday morning every year and then distributed to the parishes.

Perhaps, you can save this article and have your children identify all of these items in the Church. They can learn the names of all of the items.

I hope each of you had a wonderful Thanksgiving Dinner with your families and are enjoying the weekend. This is the last weekend of the Liturgical Year and next weekend, we will begin the Season of Advent in preparation for Christmas.
