
TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 15 OCTOBER 2023

On October 22, we will join Catholics worldwide to observe World Mission Sunday by celebrating the love of the Lord and help bring the Good News to all corners of the Earth.

Inspired by the story of the disciples on the way to Emmaus, Pope Francis chose this year's theme: "Hearts on fire, feet on the move." He invites us to reflect on these images, "their hearts burned within them as they heard the Scriptures explained by Jesus, their eyes were opened as they recognized him and, ultimately, their feet set out on the way." As Missionary disciples, we seek inspiration in the Scriptures. We also look to the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist as the source and summit of the Church's Mission so we can evangelize with zeal and urgency.

Maybe it's working, because I recently read an article concerning record airline profits. Gee whiz! I guess the pandemic/lockdown/price-of-oil impact was less than I thought? Well, at least, they could now make an effort to widen passenger seating instead of shrinking it! I'd like to have my "wee bit" back without the up-charge! I must admit that she was indeed very nicely dressed despite the cramped plane travel of today and she certainly had a very friendly, pleasant personality. We could certainly use more individuals like her in our frequently all too nasty world of today. We talked a "wee bit" but really not too much having no need to fill some kind of "lost space" within ourselves.



To be with one who blabbers on and on and on while imprisoned on a plane for some eight hours is truly annoying to say the least. Trust me. I know. One time, a gentleman took the opportunity to explain his whole philosophy of life to the priest trapped next to him for those eight hours. Sweet Jesus, have Mercy! Thankfully, the airlines still served complimentary wine in economy class at the time. I'm probably the reason they changed their policy. The pleasant woman seated next to me on my more recent flight was nothing like

that. Although, we did speak a bit, it would be more accurate to say that we communicated. *French*, she asked? No, I said shaking my head. *English or Deutsch*, I asked? Now, she shook her head. She then took out her phone and began typing. I thought that was the end of our attempt at conversation, but then she handed me her phone. The translation from her native Arabic to English read: *I am Algerian*.





I was visiting family and friends in America and I am returning home. And you?

Then, I typed into her phone. I typed that I was from Philadelphia since she wouldn't know where Stowe was. Heck, a lot of Philadelphians don't know where Stowe is. I told her that I was on my way to visit family and friends just as she had done. I typed that I would attend a wedding as well and then, I typed that I was a Catholic priest. Her eyes widened with surprise as she read and then she smiled broadly as she in turn typed. She handed her phone back to me: A wedding! How wonderful! I myself am Muslim. May Allah bless you! Thank you, I typed. May He bless

you as well! We were then quiet and content in our seats for some time. I started to watch a film on the seat back video screen. The flight crew began the meal service with an announcement of what would be served. It was the usual choice of either a meat or vegetarian meal. My Algerian friend didn't understand. She took to her phone again asking me what they announced. *They will be serving a meal*, I typed, *- meatballs or pasta*. *I don't eat meat*, she wrote.

What is "pasta?" I thought that "pasta" was universal. I have no idea how it translates into Arabic, but eventually she understood. She enjoyed her pasta while I filled up on meatballs. There's nothing like mediocre meatballs served at 30,000 feet that have you wishing that they still served complimentary

As we parted ways, we wished each other well having shared a happy company for several hours as we "talked" with one another in a rather 21st Century way. Just as a smart phone bridged the gap for two strangers of different backgrounds on a





smart phone bridged the gap for two strangers of different backgrounds on a plane, so too should Faith bridge the many gaps that people have in our world today. I so hope and pray that warring parties in both Europe and now, the Middle East can soon bridge their gaps with such Faith – and such Faith need include forgiveness. In both situations, all have far

more in common than not. Although, it would be nice to have a wee bit more space and leg room besides – why not just try to enjoy the flight, communicate as best you can, be respectful, and enjoy the meal of your choice. It's a lesson all of us need today. We're all in close quarters for a time in this life on earth as we make our Journey of Faith to Someplace Greater where ultimately, we'll gather with all of our family and friends including, we pray, some new ones from places like Palestine, Israel, Russia, Ukraine – and even Algeria.
