
THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 30 OCTOBER 2022

Although she has already been in place for a bit, the day has finally arrived for the formal blessing of our new Mary statue. She truly looks stunning. Mary Immaculate always does! In the name of the whole parish, I am ever so grateful to Lori LaRosa and all the members of the Women's Society for spearheading and organizing the whole project. What started out as "simply replacing a statue" that was rather weathered and worn began to "evolve" to say the least. There was, at first, the search for a new statue. Sounds simple enough, right? The questions and details quickly multiplied. Where does one even get a statue? Is it designed for outdoor use? Under what title of Mary is the statue rendered. Mary Immaculate, Queen of the Universe, Lourdes, Fatima, Guadalupe, Medjugorje, etc.? And naturally, the statue will come at a cost. Well, how much and how do we pay for it? There was then talk of an enclosure or covering for Mary,



refurbishing of the base on which she would stand, new landscaping, new walkway, new benches, and perhaps a fundraiser social to help pay for it all. There would be a gazebo to be positioned on the lawn. As it turns out, the gazebo will now have to wait until next spring, but certainly one can see just how quickly "simply replacing a statue" becomes a whole lot more. Again, I am grateful to Lori and the Ladies, but I am grateful to all who have thus far contributed to the project from concrete company owners to all who donated to our "statue fund." Many contributions have been made of time, talent, and treasure. It points to what a parish community together with the community at large is all about. There have certainly been some challenges along the way together with a good deal of frayed nerves, but all of that makes this day all the more special. I believe that the whole undertaking was and continues to be ultimately in the hands of Mary, herself. What we now have and will continue to work on is not only a beautiful new statue of Mary, but what I refer to as our "Marian Prayer Grotto." In addition to the gazebo being placed, a Memorial to the Unborn will eventually be

donated by the Knights of Columbus, and down the road, I would like to see outdoor Stations of the Cross and some privacy fencing as well. It is and will continue to be a place of beauty and prayer for our parish and our community. In reality, the fact that our "Marian Grotto" is there but out of our love for the Blessed Virgin Mary, means that this "sacred space" is *already* blessed. And if Mary is happy with our work thus far, how do you think that makes her only Son feel? I believe our own dear Passionist Patron is very happy as well! Enjoy this most Special Day and celebrate it! On this weekend of little goblins and ghosts may the Most Holy Ghost fill us anew with an All Saintly love for Mary Immaculate and Jesus, her Son, Our Lord. May God greatly bless our new Marian Prayer Grotto and statue as well as all those who come to pray there now and in the future!
