### REFLECTIONS FROM THE DESK OF FR. GREGORY J. HICKEY 25<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### **Background to the Reflection:**

Seven hundred fifty years Before Christ, Israel was enjoying a time of great financial and material prosperity. But spiritually they were bankrupt. In their prosperity they lost their focus on God. The Sabbath and the new moon were days of both prayer and rest. The Israelites resented this interruption in what they considered most important in life — making money. The ephah and shekel, mentioned in our first reading, were weights used in buying and selling. They didn't use honest weights, thereby cheating both their suppliers and their customers. They even exploited their customers by mixing useless materials in with the products they wanted to sell — such as mixing chaff with the wheat. The world has changed considerably since then, but in many ways human nature seems to remain the same.

#### **Reflection:**

Late one night, a robber wearing a ski mask jumped into the path of a well-dressed man, stuck a gun in his side and demanded "Give me your money." Indignant, the affluent man said, "You can't do this. I'm a United States Congressman!" "In that case," replied the robber, "give me my money."

That's what the rich man in this weekend's gospel wanted: his money. He had heard that his employee was taking advantage of him. Whether the employee was stealing from the rich man or not isn't the main point, although he probably was. And whether the employee reducing the debt that various business people owed his master was honest or dishonest is not the point of the parable either. The main point is that the employee was clever and wasted no time in planning for a secure future for himself.

Jesus tells us we need to be just as clever in planning for a secure future for ourselves, and it's not just for the few years we spend on this earth that we have to provide, but also for our time in eternity. Jesus is constantly reminding us that material things can make us feel so secure in this life that we forget about what is most important, our eternal life. That was the point of today's first reading from the Book of Amos.

The prosperous era that the Israelites were enjoying 750 years before Christ led them to forget about the God who had blessed them so richly. When they lost touch with God, this led to the moral decline of the nation and its eventual collapse. Our life in this world is temporary. Eternity is forever. Jesus is telling us this weekend to use the blessings God has given to help us get closer to God and not let our possessions become a god in themselves.

History has a way of repeating itself. We as Catholics and as citizens of this great nation must remember that we were founded as one nation, under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all. We just remembered the tragedy of 9/11 last weekend. In the midst of chaos and grief, we came together as a nation and packed our churches as we looked towards God. We can be like the Israelites and let down our guard. We too, can forget about God and take Him out of our lives and replace Him with new cathedrals that speak to us of a new reality that is devoid of Him. Sometimes, because of political correctness, some can fear mentioning His name but He never fails to mention ours.

In conclusion, great ideas come into our world as gently as doves. Perhaps if I listen attentively, I shall hear amid the uproar of empires and nations, a faint flutter of wings and a gentle stirring of life and hope. (Adapted from the journals of Albert Camus [1913-1960], a French novelist, playwright, and philosopher.)

Perhaps this week, as part of your Centering Prayer, take the italicized part of the conclusion and see what "gentle stirrings" you can identify. It also works well with Lectio Divina.
